1. Introduction

The results of our latest 'tracking' study are they same as the results of the Gallup survey published in the Daily Telegraph on 15th August. The survey conducted from 7th to 12th August involved interviews with over 1,000 electors throughout Great Britain.

The survey found 40% claiming they would vote Labour, 34% for one of the so-called 'Alliance' parties, 24% Conservative and 2% for 'other' parties. This is the lowest level of Conservative support since late 1981. Our support has dropped from 30% in late July (17-22 July) to 24% in the latest study; Labour support has increased from 30% to 40% over the same period, 'Alliance' support has fallen from 36.5% to 34%.

Full details of the trend of support for the main parties since January 1985 showing voting intentions when those respondents not giving details of voting intention are excluded and when they were included as a separate group are shown in the tables in section 2 below:

3. Government Record

Gallup found the lowest level of approval of the record of the Government since 1981/early 1982. Only 23% claimed to approve of our record to date (32% at start of year), 65% disapproved (53% at start of year) and 12% did not have a view (14% at start of year). Details are shown in the table below:-

4. Popularity of Political Leaders

Mrs. Thatcher's popularity is at the lowest level since 1981/82 with 30% claiming to be satisfied with her as Prime Minister, 65% dissatisfied and 5% with no view. This compares with 39% claiming to be satisfied with Mrs. Thatcher at the start of the year, 57% dissatisfied and 5% with no view. Mr. Kinnock's popularity remains around the 34% level - around which point is has fluctuated since the start of the year.

The popularity of both Mr. Steel and Dr. Owen fell but they both remain significantly more popular than at the start of the year. Details are shown in the tables on the following page:-

5. Published Polls

The Daily Telegraph on 15th August included, in addition to the standard tracking questions, a number of other questions on attitudes to the Government.

Even among Conservative supporters, 48% agreed with the view that the Conservatives are too rigid and inflexible (78% agreed among the electorate).

70% of the electorate, including 29% of Conservative supporters, agreed with the statement that Conservatives don't care what hardships their policies cause.

75% of the electorate, including 43% of Conservatives, agreed with the view that the Conservatives have failed to solve Britain's most important problems.

74% of the electorate, including 32% of the Conservatives, agreed with the view that the Conservatives look after the interests of the rich, not ordinary people.

85% of the electorate, including 56% of the Conservatives, agreed with the view that the Conservatives want to cut back too much on health, education and other services.

77% of the electorate, including 56% of the Conservatives, agreed with the view that causing unemployment is not an acceptable way to deal with inflation.

59% of the electorate, including 33% of Labour supporters agreed with the view that Labour has become too extreme.

62% of the electorate, including 38% of Labour supporters agreed with the view that Labour leadership is poor now.

70% of the electorate, including 49% of Labour supporters, agreed that Labour is too split and divided.

67% of the electorate, including 42% of Labour supporters, agreed that 'It's not very clear what a vote for Labour means these days'.

(b) MORI (Sunday Times, 18th August 1985)
