YOUR SPEECH - FURTHER IDEAS

The more I think about the presentation of your speech next week, the more I think you need to aim for the following:

- To bring out the distinctive, popular nature of your brand of politics.
- To play to your strengths, notably your position in the world, defence, trade unions, taxation, inflation and financial control, encouragement of enterprise.
- 3. To highlight perhaps subliminally, the point that is beginning to dawn on a lot of people: you represent stability, consistency, continuity; the alternative, all along the line, is instability.
- 4. To meet the allegations you talk down to people hence my earlier suggestion of a conversational style in which you share your speech with your audience, using such phrases as "Well let's think this through" or "Let me examine this with you". I think the speech needs to be written with this point very much in mind, for I suspect it is at the root of some criticism of you.
- 5. To <u>demonstrate</u> that you do indeed <u>care</u> not, repeat not, by going all soft and gooey, but head on with fact, argument and example.
- 6. To meet the allegation that you are remote and never meet the people; if possible points in the speech should be illustrated with examples of what you have learned from meeting people in all parts of the country, and especially in the North.
- 7. To meet the claim that your Government lacks vision; hold out your vision of Britain moving through the '90s to the 21st Century.
